

Synopsis

Her daughters and her sister, lost in their own problems - adultery, suicide, racism, drug-addicted children, violence, incest and pedophilia - must face the cruelty of each other.

Part Eugene O'Neill tragedy, part black comedy, AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY will make you laugh one moment and wince in horror the next as the family's secrets, lies and malice are revealed.

Did You Know...

Playwright Tracy Letts grew up in Oklahoma and based parts of this Pulitzer Prize winning play on his mother's family?

His grandfather committed suicide.

Raised in poverty in Oklahoma, Letts' grandmother kept a diary when she was 13 years old that he read. "She was just a little kid, with little kid ideas and dreams," he told the *Sunday Times of London*. "And then I think about what she became as a result of her experiences."

His grandmother, a spiteful woman addicted to prescription drugs, spent time in psychiatric hospitals because she was psychologically or emotionally unbalanced.

Letts told the *Sunday Times*, "she was continually challenging for my family, especially for my mother, who was an only child. She wasn't aware of how bad she was when she was."

When Mr. Letts' mother read AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY, she said, "I think you've been very kind to my mother."

THE APPLE DOES NOT FALL TOO FAR FROM THE TREE

AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY introduces a family in crisis, on the verge of a total and complete meltdown. These people are not a warm, loving family who will stand by and help each other. This family is not filled with kindness and generosity. This is a family of vipers.

How did they get that way? Their parents, with addictions to alcohol and drugs, have lied to and cheated on each other for years. The children have been emotionally and mentally abused by their mother.

The American Medical Association definition of Emotional Abuse: "when a child is regularly threatened, yelled at, humiliated, ignored, blamed or otherwise emotionally mistreated. Emotional abuse is more than just verbal abuse. It is an attack on a child's emotional and social development, and is a basic threat to healthy human development."

Adults who were abused as children, according the Mental Health Journal, can face: "having a partner with a substance abuse problem; anxiety disorders; chronic head, face or pelvic pain; eating disorders; musculoskeletal complaints; depression; gastrointestinal distress or symptoms; asthma or other respiratory ailments; obesity, eating disorders; insomnia; panic; sexual dysfunction; substance abuse; suicidal ideation or behavior; pseudo-neurologic symptoms; unintended pregnancy; self-injury; Coming to Cleveland The Apple Does Not Fall Too Far from the Tree O'Neill or Letts? and abuse their families."

What happens to children who are abused? What will they be like as adults? Will they become just like their parents? Does the apple not fall too far from the family tree? Look at what the Weston family says and decide.

Talking of her father, Ivy, the middle Weston daughter, realizes, "he never liked any of us, never had any special feeling of any kind for his children."

Violet, the matriarch of the Weston clan declares, "Y'know...if I ever called my mom a liar? She would have knocked my goddamn head off my shoulders...one of my dear mother's gentleman friends was attacking me with a claw hammer!...My momma was a nasty, mean old lady. I suppose that's where I get it from...I am a drug addict...Y'see these little blue babies? Try to get 'em away from me and I'll eat you alive."

The husband of the eldest Weston daughter, Barbara, tells his wife, "Violet really has a way of putting you in attack mode. You have such a rage for her you can't help dishing it in my direction...You get in this masochistic frame of mind that actually desires to be hurt."

Barbara, tells her daughter, Jean, "I don't care what else you do, where you go, how you screw up your life."

Barbara's husband says she treats her daughter Jean as "a buffer between you and the shrill insanity of your mother."

Karen, the youngest Weston daughter tells herself, "You punish yourself, you tell yourself, it's your fault," and realizes, "I've been really unhappy for most of my life."

Finally, lvy tells her sisters, "Don't lay this sister thing on me now, all right. I don't buy it. I haven't bought it for a long time...I can't perpetuate these myths of family or sisterhood anymore. We're all just people, some of us accidentally connected by genetics, a random selection of cells. Nothing more."

Then she tells her mother and Barbara, "You're monsters...Picking the bones of the rest of us."

Barbara tells Ivy, "it wasn't me, it was Mom." To which her sister Ivy replies, "there's no difference."

Like mother, like daughter? The apple doesn't fall too far from the family tree.

AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY has been compared to Eugene O'Neill's classic family drama *Long Day's Journey Into Night*. Both plays received Tony Awards for best play and Pulitzer Prizes for drama: O'Neill in 1957 and Letts in 2008.

Tracy Letts, AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY's playwright, used some of the same character traits and themes that O'Neill used in *Long Day's Journey Into Night*, such as a drug addicted mother, an alcoholic father, three siblings, financial issues, dysfunction, inability to communicate, use of drugs or alcohol to cope, failure to face reality and a disease that symbolizes the family.

Here are some quotes from *Long Day's Journey Into Night...*or are they from AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY? You be the judge.

AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY was produced by Steppenwolf, a Chicago based theater company formed in 1974. The name comes from a novel by Hermann Hesse.

The mission of the company is to "advance the vitality and diversity of American theater by nurturing artists, encouraging repeatable creative relationships and contributing new works to the national canon."

The company began in Highland Park, Illinois in 1974, when several Highland Park High School classmates wanted to put on a production of And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little. The production was a success and several shows later, some of the students were attending college at Illinois State University. Terry Kinney, Jeff Perry and Gary Sinise decided that after graduation, they would start a professional resident ensemble theater company.

A number of actors, known for their work in film and TV, including Gary Sinise, John Malkovich, Joan Allen, John Mahoney, Martha Plimpton, Glenne Headly, Gary Cole, Kathryn Erbe and Laurie Metcalf, began their careers as members of the Steppenwolf ensemble.

Steppenwolf has been honored with many awards including:

1988 National Medal of Arts, awarded by President Bill Clinton acknowledging Steppenwolf as "deserving of special recognition by reason of their





TALKING WITH SHANNON COCHRAN

Buzz Extra spoke with Obie, Theatre World and Joseph Jefferson Award winner Shannon Cochran. Ms. Cochran is a versatile performer who has been seen in musicals and straight plays on stages in New York, London, Chicago and L.A. Her film credits include *The Ring, Star Trek: Nemesis* and *The Substance of Things Hoped For*. Her TV credits include appearances on *Numb3rs, The Office,* and *Law and Order: SVU.* A Steppenwolf veteran of many years, Shannon Cochran plays Barbara Fordham in **AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY.**



EXTRA: When did you catch the acting bug?

COCHRAN: When I went to Wake Forest University, I was going to be a French and English major. Once I wandered into the Theatre Department, and they started casting me in plays....the head of the department told me I was actually pretty talented at this, but that I should leave and go somewhere where I could be trained properly. And I could make more money if I could sing and dance. So I took his advice and went to [University of] Cincinnati [College] Conservatory.

EXTRA: The singing and dancing really worked out for you.

COCHRAN: It really has. Afterwards, I went to Chicago and it's such a huge theater town. There was musical theater and straight theater, and I could do both.

EXTRA: So, how did you hook up with Steppenwolf?

COCHRAN: When I was doing a musical in Chicago, a Steppenwolf member, Rondi Reed, was also in the musical, and said to me, "We're looking for someone to play the tap dance teacher in our production of *Stepping Out*," which is a straight play, but it has tap dancing in it. So, she cast me as the teacher. I got along well with them, and they liked what I did. I've done maybe 12 or 15 productions since then.

EXTRA: After Chicago?

COCHRAN: I went to L.A. for pilot (TV) season and would come back to do plays in Chicago, but eventually it made more sense to stay in L.A. I met my future husband on the set of *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine*, and he liked it there. I started staying longer and longer. I could still get some theater gigs in Chicago, but in L.A., I could teach and

EXTRA: So do you feel, as Barbara says in the play, that you're running things now?




