Talking With The Rockettes

The **Rockettes** are the **world's most famous precision dance team**. They always move as "one dancer." Costumes, make-up and hair are completely identical. The dancers even give the illusion of being the same height by having the tallest dancers in the center of the line, and gradually decreasing the height with the shortest women at either end. They are known for their precision **eye-high kick line**.

Home It's Beginning to Look A Lot Like Christmas Talking with the Rockettes Costumes by the Numbers Origins of the Rockettes Animals in the Living Nativity Enrich Your Experience: Broadway Buzz Events Recommended Reading from Cleveland Public Library BUZZ EXTRA spoke with Radio City Rockettes **Kara Jones** of **Cincinnati, Ohio** and **Jessica Pack** of **Spartanburg, South Carolina** when they were in Cleveland for the kick off of the 2008-09 PlayhouseSquare season.

Jessica Pack is in the RADIO CITY CHRISTMAS SPECTACULAR show in New York City while Kara Jones tours to 18 cities with the show. Ms. Pack has been a Rockette for seven seasons and Ms. Jones is in her second season.

EXTRA: How do you get to be a Rockette?

ROCKETTES: You have to be between five feet, six inches and five feet, ten and a half inches tall, proficient in ballet, tap, and jazz dance and at least 18 years old, but there are no other restrictions.

I grew up watching the Rockettes in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

I auditioned at Radio City Music Hall. I got there in the morning and saw a big line of tall, long-legged women wrapped around the corner. I was number 500 and something. I learned some choreography and the famous "high-kick" routines, made it through the first round of cuts, came back for the second round the next day, then got a phone call over the summer and found out I'm going to be a Rockette. I was SOOO excited. A dream come true.

Dancing is a competitive business. **Everyone has to re-audition every year**. It keeps the best women on the line every year, so you are seeing the most talented people.

EXTRA: How many Rockettes are there in a show?

ROCKETTES: 18.

EXTRA: How many shows do you do in a day?

ROCKETTES: We can do up to four shows a day.


EXTRA: Four shows a day? How many eye-high kicks is that?

ROCKETTES: The daily kick count is 1200.

EXTRA: How do you stay fit?

ROCKETTES: Each dancer is different, but it's important to stretch out, get the cardiovascular system up

EXTRA: What is the daily life of a Rockette like?

ROCKETTES: During the rehearsals we dance six hours a day, six days a week. That keeps us in pretty good shape. It's nice to be able to eat pretty much what you want, though. We need the proteins and carbs!

During the show, we get up, go to the theater to get hair and makeup, do the warm-ups and there's an athletic trainer if you need something wrapped or taped. Then on with the show. We do one to four shows a day. Sometimes we have 30 minutes between shows or a couple of hours. Sometimes we don't get out until 11:30 PM, depending on the schedule.

EXTRA: What is your favorite thing about being a Rockette?

ROCKETTES: As people are leaving the theater, they are happy, inspired and they haven't had to think about their problems for two hours. It's all Christmas and joy. That is very rewarding. A dream come true.

EXTRA: What about next year?

ROCKETTES: We're both going to audition again next year.

EXTRA: Well, we're so glad you could be in Cleveland for the holidays.

ROCKETTES: It's great to be back in Cleveland.

- 2 costumes for the live camels
- More than **100** hats
- Vincente Minnelli (father of Liza, husband of Judy Garland and famous film director of *American in Paris* and *Meet Me in St. Louis*) designed the wooden soldier costumes for the **1933** show. This costume design has been used ever since.
- Wooden Soldier costumes have taken up to 12 hours to make.
- The Wooden Soldier hats are almost 3 feet tall.
- In the scene *Santa's Gonna Rock and Roll*, **80 pairs of sparkle tights** are used per year. These tights have been custom made and painted by hand to create the sparkle.
- Rockettes wear 2 and a half inch heels, regardless of height.
- Each Rockette uses 9 pairs of shoes in one season
- There have been as many as **3,000 Swarovski crystals** in a costume and it has been said that the Rockettes wear "more sparkles than Elizabeth Taylor's jewelry box."
- There can be up to **13 "dressers**" or backstage crew who help the performers with quick changes and keep track of all costumes.
- Since many costume changes take place in just **80 seconds**, the changes are just as choreographed as the dance numbers onstage.

Other Fun Facts

- Mimi Swenson wore hundreds of costumes in the 20 years she spent as a Rockette. She lives in the Cleveland area today.
- Russell Markert's (founder of the Rockettes) tap shoes were bronzed when he retired.
- Bob Mackie (designer for Cher, Barbra Streisand and Tina Turner) has designed a Rockette costume.

Seventy-five years ago the "dancing daughters" of Russell Markert made history by performing at the opening night of Radio City Music Hall in New York City. They have been kicking up their heels ever since. But the **history of the Rockettes actually begins in England.**

• **1885** - Englishman John Tiller revolutionized chorus dancing by introducing a straight line of girls with uniform height and weight dancing in precision, forming straight lines and geometric shapes.

Tiller discovered that if the girls linked their arms around each other's waists, it enabled them to work together to improve the precision. Tiller brought his precision dancers to Paris' Folies Bergère to perform the "Pony Kick," the precursor of eye-high kicks.

- **1900** The Tiller Girls came to America, where they were recruited for the Ziegfield Follies.
- **1922** Russell Markert recalled, "I had seen the John Tiller girls in the Ziegfeld Follies. If I ever got a chance to get a group of American girls who would be taller and have longer legs and could do really complicated tap routines and eye-high kicks ...they'd knock your socks off!"
- 1925 Markert trained a group of 16 girls to make their show biz debut in St Louis in as the "Missouri Rockets." Their popularity brought them to the attention of showman S.L.(Roxy) Rothafel. He brought them to New York City to perform at his theater the "ROXY" and called them the "Roxyettes."
- 1929 Roxy Rothafel hooked up with John D. Rockefeller and his new building project in Manhattan. Rockefeller had a commercial partner called Radio Corporation of America (RCA). RCA owned the popular NBC radio programs and RKO movie studios that provided entertainment during the hard times of the Great Depression. These three partners called their new project "Radio City" and it's goal was to provide entertainment at prices people could afford.
- **1932** On December 27, at the opening of Radio City Music Hall, the "Roxyettes" shared the stage with the Flying Wallendas, Ray Bolger and Martha Graham.
- 1933 Radio City Music Hall had a Christmas Spectacular stage show featuring the newly
 named Rockettes and a movie. The Rockettes did their precision dance moves choreographed
 by Russell Markert and the holiday tradition of the Radio City Christmas Spectacular was born.
 The show included the Parade of the Wooden Soldiers and the Living Nativity that are still
 performed today!
- **1971** Russell Markert continued working with the Rockettes until he retired in 1971.
- **1979** In the early days, Radio City offered a stage show featuring the Rockettes AND a movie. This tradition lasted until 1979 when only the Christmas Spectacular and a Spring Spectacular featuring an Easter Pageant were shown.
- **1994** RADIO CITY CHRISTMAS SPECTACULAR goes on the road bringing the New York holiday tradition to cities across America.
- **2001** The RADIO CITY CHRISTMAS SPECTACULAR makes its debut in Cleveland, breaking box office records playing to audiences of over 146,000 in 52 performances.

Animals In The Living Nativity

How could Joseph and Mary journey to Bethlehem without Sarah, the Donkey? How could there be a stable without sheep? How could the Wise Men travel without camels?

To complete the RADIO CITY CHRISTMAS SPECTACULAR'S Living Nativity, two camels, one

donkey and several sheep take the stage. These animals come from **Hedrick Exotic Animal Farm** in central **Kansas**. Hedrick's has been providing animals for the Radio City Christmas Spectacular since 1994.

A lifelong rancher, Joe Hedrick had the opportunity to work with exotic animals in rodeo specialty acts. Joe and Sondra Hedrick had a love of these exotic animals and began breeding them on their farm in Nickerson, Kansas as a hobby. As their hobby grew, the Hedrick Exotic Animal Farm was born.

"More than 800 animals from giraffes to chickens call it home," says Sondra Hedrick, "including some 300 goats, 30 camels and 20 zebras."

Ostriches, Doves, Kangaroos, Pygmy Goats, Llamas, Cavies, Zebus, Reindeer, Oryx, Yaks, Nilgai, Muntjacs, Spurred Tortoises, Hedgehogs, Highlanders, Elands, Emus, Alpacas, Bison, Bongos, Jacob 4 Horns and Miniature Donkeys are some of the exotic animals that joined the Hedrick animal family. There are even a few domestic animals like cattle and ponies.


In 1992, the farm opened to the public offering pig, ostrich, goat and camel races, as well as hayrides. The farm is always looking for people who love animals as much as Joe and Sondra Hedrick, hiring a few seasonal and full-time year round employees to travel with the animals throughout the United States.
